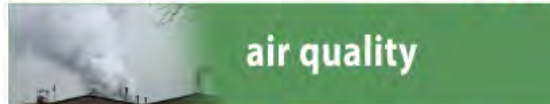

Introduction, cont.

How Can Environmental Justice be Achieved?

The City of Eugene, state, county and local agencies, schools and business owners must engage in a systematic, community-based approach to involve residents in lasting solutions to public health issues. Reducing the incidence of children's asthma is a top priority. The residents of West Eugene whose lives are affected by air pollution must have a seat at the table. West Eugene neighborhoods already

have developed strong community leaders and a community vision. Next steps must involve multi-stakeholder processes, consensus building and an alternative dispute resolution process – all under the mantle of environmental justice. Together, let us recognize the undue environmental health burdens in West Eugene and prioritize children's health and well-being as a jointly held obligation.

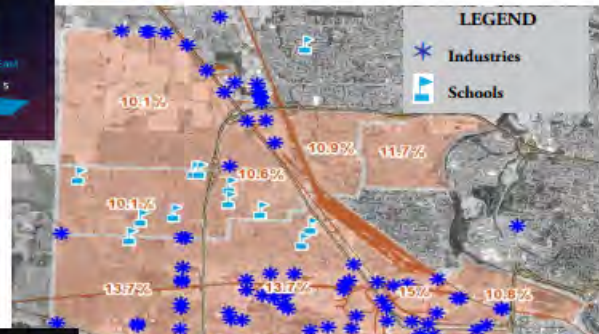

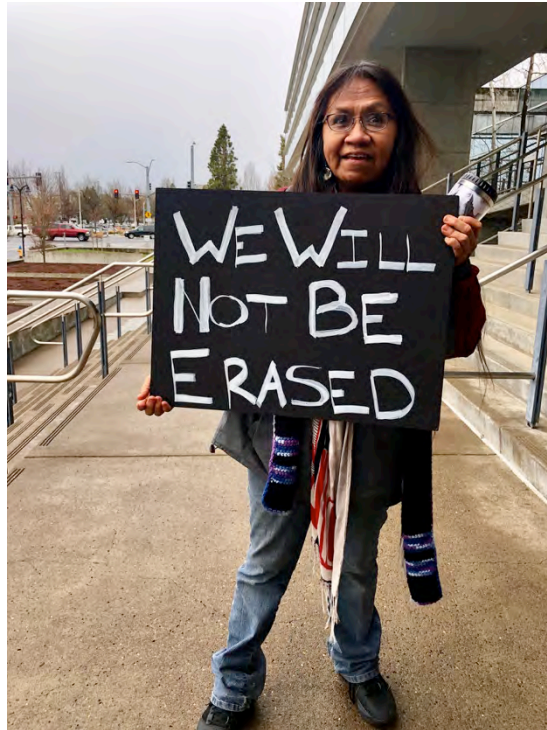

Beyond Toxics, NAACP-Eugene-Springfield and NOWIA Unete propose to form partnerships and co-lead work throughout southern Oregon to support low-income communities and communities of color most impacted by racial bias. Our project centers itself at the nexus of environmental pollution and illness, labor injustice, and immigrant rights. Our three organizations want to build strategic, long-term relationships that benefit our vulnerable communities. We believe we can effectively accomplish our goals using a strategy of grassroots organizing that cuts across issues, geography and cultures. Beyond Toxics is a statewide grassroots environmental justice organization working in multiple communities to advocate for action, mobilization

and a policy shift to prioritize environmental justice. NOWIA Unete and NAACP are respected and experienced leaders doing community building and grassroots organizing, both are our strong partners. NOWIA Unete is leading the fight for farm worker justice and immigrant rights in Southern Oregon. NAACP is Lane County's first and foremost advocate for racial justice. Beyond Toxics is the organization submitting the grant, but each organization has an equally important and unique role to play to bring our experiences together into a unified force to advance Oregon's environmental justice policy. Our three organizations seek to explore and expand the intersectionality of our experiences in racial, immigrant and environmental justice. We

recognize that, in these extraordinary times, we are called upon to be intentional about the way we connect these issues and emphasize the commonality and interconnectedness of these struggles through the specialized skills and expertise that we bring to the table.

Our goal is to be intentional about moving racial justice, immigrant justice and environmental justice into each organization's theory of change to deepen relationships and expand the leadership of people of color.
